GM cutting dealer franchises

NEW YORK — General Motors Corp. on Friday told about 1,100 dealers, or nearly 20 percent of its U.S. network, that they will be fired by the automaker late next year because their sales are weak.

It is uncertain if one of the dealerships is Harden Chevrolet, which was informed

Harden doesn't comment on local impact

Thursday it would be losing its Chrysler dealership.

"I have no comment at this time," said Don Harden, manager of the dealership which has been in business for 81 years in Pickaway County. Its Main Street location features both new and used vehicles for sale, a service department,

parts department and body shop.

GM's announcement is more bad economic news for dealers, communities and businesses still reeling from Chrysler's similar nationwide dealer cuts a day earlier. Both automakers are scrambling to reorganize and stay alive in a

severe recession that has devastated sales of cars and trucks.

While GM doesn't own the dealers, its network is too big, causing dealers to compete with each other and giving shoppers too much leverage to talk down prices and hurt the company's future sales.

Ohio has 1 month to fix budget

Economics, politics put gap about \$2 billion

COLUMBUS — A potent combination of economics and politics has Ohio lawmakers facing the prospect of repairing a hole of at least \$2 billion in the next two-year budget in a little over a month.

Among the factors: Pessimistic economic forecasts weren't pessimistic enough. The Democratic-controlled Ohio House increased spending and didn't follow through on Gov. Ted Strickland's proposals to cut spending. And the state likely faces a "U-shaped" or "L-shaped" economic recovery, according to its budget director — in other words, the economy will either recover slowly or it will do no better than simply stopping its decline.

The hole in the budget passed by the Ohio House a couple of weeks ago was partly a function of Strickland's budget staff not foreseeing the

Water extension plan stalls

Mayor concerned pipes too big for Crites-Hannan Park

The on-again-off-again water and sewer extension into Mary Virginia Crites-Hannan Park met yet another roadblock Friday as Mayor Chuck Taylor expressed concerns over the engineering specifications for the project.

"I'm not questioning the design

engineer or anything, but when we invest that kind of money, it needs to be a good investment."

Taylor voiced the concerns Friday when Tom Klitzka, city council member, delivered a formal request from council for the project to move forward as quickly as

possible.

Taylor said he received the plans May 5 and has just had a chance to review them this week. He said he intends to have the plans reviewed by a second engineering firm to insure they are correct before proceeding.

"It will be a very minimal cost," Taylor said. "I called an engineering firm [Friday], but they won't be getting back to us until Monday. It could be one of several firms, I'm not

sure yet, but we want someone to review them and make sure it's right."

The plans were engineered by Eric Clark, Michael E. Clark & Associates, using 12-inch pipe as a basis for the project, which Taylor believes is too big for the water volume that will be used at the park, potentially causing operational problems.

"That particular line is

Mill site receives federal grant

Peters Inc. gets money to conduct environmental tests

J.E. Peters Inc. was selected as Circleville's first recipient of U.S. EPA Brownfield Assessment program assistance for environmental assessment at its 327 East Mill Street property.

The site, owned by Ed Peters through Peters Mill Street LLC, was home to a mill for several decades, most recently the Manna Pro mill, until it was largely destroyed by a fire in 2008.

"The former mill property is a perfect fit for this program," said Circleville mayor Chuck Taylor. "The site has significant redevelopment potential and our hope is that the Brownfield Assessment grant assistance will help jump start that effort."

'Cancer doesn't recognize any holiday'

Ashville Relay for Life scheduled for Memorial Day weekend

ASHVILLE — Despite more than a few challenges this year, Ashville's annual Relay for Life event to benefit the American Cancer Society is set to kick off at noon May 23 at Teays Valley High School.

Though the event is scheduled for Memorial Day weekend, chairperson Sandra Oliver said she hopes it won't get lost in the rush of the holiday and other springtime activities.

"Cancer doesn't recognize any holiday, so we can't let that affect

us," Oliver said. "We've got a number of things playing against us this year, with the recession and the timing and the fact school is already out for Teays Valley, but we're hoping to have just as much success this year as we have in the past."

The fundraising goal is set at \$45,000 for 2009, she said, and 18 teams are currently registered to participate in the overnight walking event.

"Our goal is the same as last year, but our teams are down a little bit this year," Oliver said. "We're going to do the best we can, and if anyone wants

to join in, we're happy to have them."

Last year, the Ashville Relay brought in \$48,377.41 by the time the event closed Sunday morning and topped \$50,000 when all pledges were finally received.

The Ashville event is normally held the week before Memorial Day, according to Sue Pairan, regional community director for the American Cancer Society. Competition with Teays Valley's early summer release, graduation and pending construction, however, left the holiday weekend as the only option for this year's event.

\$400,000 grant from the U.S. EPA in 2008 to identify Brownfield properties in the City and cover the cost of conducting environmental assessments for property owners.

"The City of Circleville and the Pickaway Progress Partnership are handling the program's roll-out," said Nate Green, economic development director.

Informational sessions on the Brownfield Assessment program will be held at 9 a.m. Monday, May 18, and 11 a.m.

Tuesday, May 26. Both meetings will be held in the meeting room at Circleville Fire Station No. 1, 586 North Court Street.

The EPA defines a Brownfield site as real property, the expansion, redevelopment or reuse of which may be complicated by the presence or potential presence of a hazardous substance, pollutant or contaminant, according to Green.

Most often, Brownfield sites are former industrial properties and gas stations, but can also result from other uses that involve hazardous substances.

"One of the primary goals of the program is to provide property owners with assistance that offsets some of the financial challenges associated with cleaning up and redeveloping Brownfield sites," he said. "Many of these sites have the potential to be job creating properties once they are free from harmful pollutants."

The City and P3 are also able to help property owners apply for federal and state funding to remediate the sites.

part of the city's master plan, so that's the reason it's sized the way it is," Clark said. "It's also listed as a future potential water tower site, and the rest of the water line out there is the same size."

Clark said he had no idea how long a second review of the design plans would take or how much it may cost the city, but he did not consider it an unusual request.

"It's pretty typical if there's not an engineer on staff to have

them reviewed," he said. Klitzka said the mayor wants to get back to council by the middle of next week to address his concerns and options in more detail.

"The conversation went well and was very professional," Klitzka said. "Our biggest concern is all the various delays in vetoes and overrides and attempts to derail the park project itself. I think council will have additional discussion to see if it wants to move on this now or wait. It needs to be out of his office and moving forward the sooner the better."

depths of the recession.

The revenue model the governor used to craft his budget plan was pessimistic, forecasted \$2.4 billion less in tax revenue in the 2011 fiscal year than in the 2008 fiscal year. But based on recent performance, lawmakers are still likely in for an even more negative forecast before they begin to work out difference between the House and Senate budget plans.

"The reality is, everybody

has been wrong," Strickland Budget Director Pari Sabety told the Senate Finance committee in testimony on May 7.

Flawed economic forecasts have also blown a hole in the budget in a more indirect way. The House budget plan for the next two years called for the spending of the roughly \$1 billion rainy-day fund the state maintains for budget crunches. But the final months of the current budget period that ends June 30 drastically underperformed expectations, and a good chunk, if not all, of that money will likely be used to balance the current budget.

"Too many dealers, in actuality, are a problem," Mark LaNeve, GM's vice president of North American sales and marketing, said in a conference call with reporters.

GM declined to reveal which dealers will be eliminated and left it up to franchise owners to report the decision to customers.

The cuts are part of a larger GM plan to drop 2,600, or nearly 42 percent of its 6,200 dealerships as the automaker tries to restructure outside of bankruptcy court and become profitable again. Thousands of jobs will likely be lost and governments will lose untold dollars in tax revenue as dealerships are forced to close.

Besides the 1,100 dealership cuts, the company will provide updates to about 470 Saturn, Hummer and Saab dealerships on the status of those brands, which it plans to sell.

Friday's cuts will not be the last. GM said it expects to lose more dealers through attrition.

Ultimately, about 90 percent of the remaining dealerships will stay with GM, the company said.

FedEx letters bearing the bad news began arriving Friday morning at GM franchises around the country. The letter states that dealers were judged on sales, customer service scores, location, condition of facilities and other criteria.

However, the letter left open the possibility that the decision could be reversed.

"Please understand that our planning in this regard is not finalized, and we are prepared to give you until the end of the month to submit any information you would like us to see," the letter said.

Both Chrysler and GM say they are cutting the number of dealers because they have too many outlets that are too close to each other, and the competition drives down prices. But as the ranks of dealers thin and competition decreases, that likely will mean higher prices for car and truck buyers.

As GM and Chrysler lost market share to Japanese and other overseas brands, the

automakers, as well as Ford Motor Co., ended up with too many dealerships. Many are barely getting by and can't afford to upgrade their facilities or hire the best personnel to compete with the Japanese, who have far fewer dealerships.

With fewer dealers, consumers won't see as much competition, said Aaron Bragman, an automotive industry analyst with the consulting firm IHS Global Insight.

GM knows it will lose sales in the short-term, but over the long haul, fewer dealers will mean higher per-vehicle profits, Bragman said.

In the 1980s, GM, Chrysler and Ford controlled more than 75 percent of U.S. sales, but that dropped to 48 percent last year. GM alone held nearly 51 percent of the market in 1962, but only 22 percent last year.

Bragman said GM likely will go into bankruptcy protection on June 1, but it's starting to negotiate deals ahead of the filing to speed up the Chapter 11 process.
